E-BIT course



Following on from the last edition of the 'Falcon News', we have now enrolled two groups on the new exciting E-BIT NVQ Level 2.

As mentioned in March, the new course has been updated to incorporate useful refreshers on topics that adult learners may not have used for a long time. It still gives you an NVQ Level 2 in Business Improvement Techniques, but it also gives you an opportunity to gain further qualifications in Literacy and Numeracy.

Feedback from Pera has been brilliant; they are so pleased that after the first day of enrolling the two groups, the learners began to access the online training courses at home. 60% of those that enrolled logged on to do further Literacy & Numeracy online learning, which is very encouraging.

Just an interesting fact: 64 Numeracy on-line lessons were completed within one day compared to only 27 Literacy on-line lessons! The learners are clearly more number crunching lovers than story writing creators!

Frank Dakin (1939 – 2010)

It is with deep regret that we have to report the death of Frank Dakin. Frank started at BRUSH in 1953 and remained here until he retired in 1993.

Frank will be mostly remembered for his time in 24 Shop, initially working on the Ljungstrom turbines & large frequency changers, to all frame sizes of DAX generators, especially looking after the rotor balancing operations in the overspeed pits. He also worked off site for the Outside Erection Dept (now Aftermarket) all over the world, including Hong Kong.

Frank started at BRUSH distributing mail round the offices and soon moved onto the

apprenticeship scheme, which led him into many positions of authority. He had respect for honesty, loyalty and rewarding hard work, even though it might have only been a bag of chips after a hard night's work!

Frank always took a keen interest and was very popular with the apprentices spending much time with them; many of them are still employed here.

Frank's interests included Rock and Rolling, and he regularly took centre stage at the BRUSH Club along with his wife Josie. He also enjoyed all things to do with engineering and especially fitting, He had many wonderful old vintage time pieces chiming, around the house and he also enjoyed pub quizzes as a member of the BRUSH Club quiz team. He loved motor racing and anything to do with motor sport Vauxhalls, hence his love for his 'Droop Snoot' high performance firenza. He was also a founder member of the 'Droop Snoot Group', which now has over a thousand members.

His son Tim said, "Dad had the most wonderful of characters, a big heart for all his family and friends, a big man with the warmest of embrace. A hug from big Frank meant the world, his advice gave everyone reassurance and support. A truly special father, husband and friend who leaves us all with a big empty space".



Riverside Resource Recovery Facility

BRUSH's contribution to improving the environment has increased with the despatch earlier this year of a BDAX 8-365ERH generator (serial number 916031.010) for the Riverside Resource Recovery Facility at Norman Road, Belvedere, on the south bank of the River Thames in the London Borough of Bexley.

Until now, London has disposed of over half of its municipal solid waste in landfills, many of them outside the city. In 2002, Cory Environmental was awarded a 30-year contract with the Western Riverside Waste Authority (WRWA) to handle municipal waste from six London boroughs. The Riverside Resource Recovery Facility, also referred to as an Energy from Waste (EfW) plant, is Cory Environmental's single most significant development project. When operational, it will be one of the UK's most efficient energy recovery plants, processing almost 600,000 tonnes per year of waste from households and businesses in central London.

Almost all of the waste will be delivered in enclosed containers to the plant via the River Thames and off loaded at a new specially constructed jetty. The waste combustion process will be carefully and continuously monitored and heat energy will be recovered from the flue gases through specialist, high efficiency boilers. The plant will be capable of supplying up to 30 MW of steam for district heating and up to 80 MW of electricity. Approximately 6 MW of this will be used to run the plant, with the remainder being exported to the grid.

The principal residue from the process will be bottom ash, almost 200,000 tonnes of which, including metals, will be produced each year. This will be collected and loaded into covered containers which will be loaded on barges and sent on the River Thames for metal recovery and for recycling into road building and construction aggregates.

Our success in the EfW market sector continues with the recent order for a BDAX 9-335ERH generator for the Tuas waste incineration plant in Singapore. This generator will be built at Plzen for despatch in 2011; we anticipate two Loughborough-built 40 MW machines for the same project being ordered for delivery in 2012 and 2013. BRUSH Generators chosen for upgrade of Portuguese Refinery



Two BRUSH BDAX 7-290ERHN generators, despatched at the beginning of this year, are currently being installed, to be driven by General Electric Frame 6B gas turbines, at Galp Energia's Matosinhos cogeneration plant near Oporto, one of the largest cogeneration facilities in Portugal.

Replacing older, oil-fired technology, they will increase the plant's efficiency and improve its environmental impact by reducing carbon dioxide emissions by over 400,000 tonnes per year. The turbines are expected to provide all of the steam and electricity requirements for the nearby Matosinhos Refinery, with the excess electricity generated being sold to Portugal's national grid.

Two General Electric Frame 6B gas turbines, also driving BRUSH BDAX 7-290ERHN generators, recently entered commercial operation at a cogeneration plant that supports the Sines petrochemical Industrial park.

Wadham delight at BRUSH Aftermarket

When Wadham utilised the services of a third party, non OEM, to service their BRUSH generator, problems arose. By disturbing the PMG bolting during a rotor pull and through inadequate knowledge and experience of the machine, the non OEM was unable to offer a solution to the problem they created. Wadham subsequently contacted BRUSH Aftermarket to help achieve a satisfactory outcome.

The situation was time critical and it was not feasible to dispatch an engineer to site at such

short notice. However, a highly trained BRUSH engineer was immediately available to discuss the situation, over the phone, with the client.

Delighted with the knowledge and competence shown by the BRUSH engineer, the client immediately commissioned BRUSH to offer technical support, via telephone, in order to fully identify the problem with the damaged machine. During the subsequent phone calls the engineer was able to discuss the issues in more detail and identify the correct solution to the problem. The engineer also identified an alternative (short term fix) solution, which allowed the customer to get the generator temporarily back up and running, until the necessary parts to service the final solution were delivered to site.

The client was delighted with the outcome and subsequently committed to only deal with BRUSH Aftermarket for their future servicing needs.
